Principal Updates

Even though there's been snow on the ground and it might not feel like it, we are well into the spring semester. All students have begun to receive grades in PowerSchool, and should be making plans to stay focused and present to be successful as we keep moving forward.

Seniors, you are in the last four months of school. It might feel far away, but this is the final push and you will be graduating in what feels like no time. You need to be present in your college classes, as you cannot succeed in those courses without being there. Failing grades on college courses will follow you much longer than your high school transcript will; it will matter to schools you are applying to for admission this fall, it will follow you through your college career and impact what courses you are or are not allowed to take and when you can take them, and, if you choose to pursue graduate school in the next four years after high school, it can impact what programs you're able to get into. These college course grades matter. Go to class, do the work, and end successfully with more college credits so that you can finish college sooner (and for less money).

Following the vacation, we will be coming back to RINI with a revised cell phone policy. Overwhelmingly, families have told us that they support an all-day phone ban. However, we want to afford the students one more opportunity to do what we need to put education first.

Beginning on Monday, February 24th when we return from break, students are expected to use the classroom wall hangers to store their phones during class. They cannot take them out during class period or if they leave to use the restroom. They may use their phones in the halls when changing classes and during lunch in the cafeteria. Students who are found with cell phones will have the devices confiscated, and cell phones will have to be picked up by parents.

As a reminder, for cybersecurity and safety reasons, students on the RINI Wifi Network are required to use their school-issued Chromebooks. Students attending college classes can use their personal devices there, but otherwise, to protect your personal data, Chromebooks are the only acceptable devices for use at school.

Families, we are asking that you continue to help your students get to school on time, every day. The biggest impact on student success is attendance. We have made huge progress in improving our overall school attendance this year, and we continue to get better. Our schoolwide goal is to reduce chronic absenteeism, and we are doing great, but we need everyone's involvement.

Juniors, keep coming to SAT Prep. Attendance is mandatory, and this is a service that we are providing that can improve your SAT scores. High SAT scores help your chances of getting into the college programs you're looking for, and they help qualify you for scholarships to keep college costs down.

While it's February now, spring is just around the corner. I want to wish everyone a safe and relaxing February Vacation. We'll see you on the 24th!

RINI ILLNESS POLICIES

Doctor's notes should be provided whenever possible for illness or injury. Doctor's notes are also required for any absences lasting longer than 3 consecutive days. While the note does NOT excuse the absence, it does provide documentation regarding the absences that are required for attendance purposes.

1. Fever

- Criteria: 100.4°F or higher
- Exclusion: Students must stay home until they are fever-free for 24 hours without medication.

2. Diarrhea

• Exclusion: Students must stay home for 24 hours after the last episode.

3. Vomiting

• Exclusion: Students must stay home for 24 hours after the last episode.

4. Impetigo

- Action: The student will be sent home.
- Return: 24 hours after antibiotics are started.

5. Mononucleosis (Mono)

• Exclusion: No exclusion is required.

6. Chickenpox

• Exclusion: Students must stay home for seven days after the onset of the rash or until all blisters have crusted and dried out.

7. Strep Throat

• Return: 24 hours after the start of treatment.

8. Scarlet Fever

• Return: 24 hours after the start of treatment.

9. Hand, Foot, and Mouth Disease

- Exclusion: Students must be fever-free for 24 hours.
- 10.Covid: Students must be fever-free for 24 hours without fever reducing medication.

Importance of Vaccinations

Vaccines are a vital part of public health and have significantly reduced the incidence of many contagious diseases. By ensuring that all students are vaccinated, we protect those who are unable to receive vaccines due to medical reasons and help prevent outbreaks of preventable illnesses. Policy Reminders

Cellphones

Cellphones should be in the wall hangers in each classroom during class. Students can retrieve their phones at the end of each period and will need to place them back in the wall pouches at the start of their next class. The electronic device must remain in the classroom holder for the entire period. Students caught using their phones in class will have the devices confiscated, and parents will be required to come collect the phone.

Attendance Matters!

RINI opens its doors to students at 7:30AM for breakfast, and Period 1 classes start promptly at 8AM. The Rhode Island Department of Education has launched the Attendance MattersRI Campaign to encourage schools and families to work together on improving school attendance. Research shows that chronic absenteeism (missing 10% or more of the school year) can lead to lower academic achievement, disengagement, course failures, and an increased risk of dropping out.

Dress Code

Our dress code policy has been updated; details are at the end of this newsletter. As a reminder, students are NOT allowed to wear hoodies as part of their uniform. We recommend that students bring a cardigan or wear a scrub jacket. There are also coat hooks in classrooms for students to hang coats on.


Student Spotlight: Jizelle Hernandez

Nominated by Mrs. Boyajian



Our school utilizes the SchoolMessenger system to deliver text messages, straight to your mobile phone with important information about events, school closings, safety alerts and more.*

You can participate in this free service" just by sending a text message of "Y" or "Yes" to our school's short code number, 67587.

You can also opt out of these messages at any time by simply replying to one of our messages with "Stop".

SchoolMessenger is compliant with the <u>Student Privacy</u> <u>PledgeTM</u> so you can rest assured that your information is safe and will never be given or sold to anyone.

Information on SMS text messaging and Short Codes: SMS stands for Short Message Service and is commonly referred to as a "text message". Most cell phones support this type of text messaging. Our notification provider, SchoolMessenger, uses a true SMS protocol developed by the telecommunications industry specifically for mass text messaging, referred to as "short code" texting. This method is fast, secure and highly reliable because it is strictly regulated by the wireless carriers and only allows access to approved providers.

If you've ever sent a text vote for a TV show to a number like 46999, you have used short code texting.

IMPORTANT UNIFORM UPDATES

Purpose of Uniform (Scrubs):

The uniform policy at this healthcare-focused organization requires students to wear scrubs to simulate a professional environment and ensure a seamless transition into nursing school. This policy prepares students for the standards and expectations of a healthcare career, emphasizing professionalism, hygiene, and safety.

We have observed several students wearing compression zip-ups or cardigans without a scrub top underneath. While this time is serving as a grace period for zip-ups, please be reminded that it is expected a scrub top is worn underneath the zip-up/cardigan every day.

Students who are out of dress code will receive dress code violations. Multiple violations will require a family meeting.

Non-Negotiables
