



Principal's Updates

We're a month into the school year and it is officially fall. Students should start to see their first assessment grades posted on PowerSchool; for help accessing accounts, please reach out to your student's counselors (jfranzoni@rinimc.org and afleury@rinimc.org) or Mrs. Alford (jalford@rinimc.org). These first assessments can provide students a starting point for the semester to make goals from, and students should feel welcome to stay after school with their teachers for any extra help, or to make up any missed assessments.

I want to congratulate our students on their attendance for the first month of the school year. Over the past four weeks, 90 percent of our students have been present in school. This puts RINI well above the state attendance average—and we want to make sure we keep that up. Attendance matters, so keep coming to school every day, on time.

We have updated our early dismissal policy. This can be read in full in this newsletter, but the key takeaways are that students who are being dismissed early should bring a note to the main office before their first period class, that we are not able to take early dismissals over the phone, and that parents need to come into the building and check in with our security desk in order to dismiss their child.

A form will be sent soon regarding free/reduced lunch. This will be sent via ecollect, and it is important that families complete this form. It only needs to be completed once, even if you have multiple children attending RINI. This document is important for our lunch programming, and it is vital that all families complete it.

SUPPORT UPDATES | EARLY DISMISSAL POLICY

Early Dismissal Procedures

In order to ensure that our school and students are safe, we have established an early dismissal procedure.

Early Dismissals: Students who leave the building during the school day must be cleared through the Attendance Office. A note from a parent requesting the early dismissal should be brought to the main office before the student's **first period class**. The note must include the date, full name, grade, reason for dismissal, parent's signature, and phone number where the parent can be reached.

Due to the hectic nature of a main office, we do not take early dismissals over the phone.

When picking up a child for an early dismissal, the adult must come into the reception lobby and show a picture ID. Once security has verified the parent information and all pertinent information matches our system, the Main Office will contact the classroom and send the student to the lobby. All students must check out at the main office prior to leaving the building. We will not be able to call a student to the office to wait for his/her ride to arrive.

We ask that you do not text your child to come down until you have checked in with security.

Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School: Pay Attention to Attendance

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Frequent absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10%, or 2 days a month, over the course of the school year, can affect a student's academic success.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Make school attendance a priority

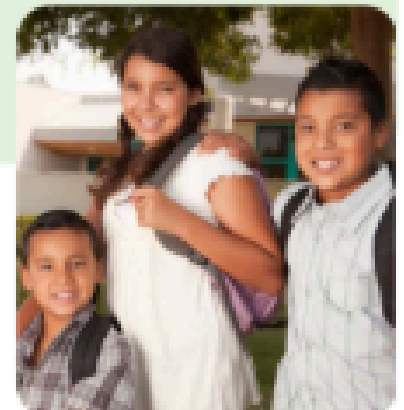
- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day.
- Help your children maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and non-urgent related medical appointments during the school day.
- Keep your student healthy. If you are concerned about a contagious illness, call your school or health care provider.
- If your children must stay home because they are sick, make sure they have asked teachers for resources and materials to make up for the missed learning time in the classroom.

Help your teen stay engaged

- Find out if your children feel engaged by their classes, and feel safe from bullies and other threats.
- Make sure your teens are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, contact the school and work with them to find a solution.
- Monitor your teen's academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors when necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage your child to join meaningful after-school activities, including sports and clubs.
- Support your students if you notice signs of anxiety, and if needed, seek advice from your school or health provider.

Communicate with the school

- Know the school's attendance policy - incentives and penalties.
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not adding up.
- Seek help from school staff, other parents, or community agencies if you need support.
