Chromebooks ONLY, Please: Students are only allowed to use their Chromebooks in school when they are online – NO EXCEPTIONS. The RINI network has specific safety measures in place to protect your students from online intrusions. This important safety net does not extend to other laptops that students may bring to school. As a result, students MAY NOT use their personal laptops and tablets in school to access online work. Students can take notes on tablets but will still need their school issued computer. Please remind your students to pack their school-approved Chromebooks and chargers each morning.

## **Principal Updates**

November has come to RINI fast, and we are almost at the halfway point of semester 1. Momentum picks up around this time, and we encourage students to stay on top of their work as classes move into their next units of study. Grades can be viewed on PowerSchool, and we encourage families, students, and teachers to work together to ensure student success as the semester continues.

During this past month, students completed the fall PSAT/SAT Suite of Assessments, and scores should be available from College Board by the end of November. We encourage students to use these scores from the fall to help set goals for academic growth and progress, as the next in-school PSAT and SAT Tests will be held in the spring. Both standardized tests provide scholarship opportunities for students, and many nursing programs have a minimum required test score for entry.

Students should also be aware that we will begin Accuplacer testing, which is used by CCRI as their college course placement exam. Students who receive the minimum passing score on Accuplacer can begin taking college classes as early as their sophomore year. For questions, please contact Ms. Bininger (tbininger@rinimc.org). Preparing for Accuplacer will also help students prepare for other standardized testing.

It is never too late to get into a good habit and good routine, and we want to remind students that their attendance in school matters. It is still one of the biggest factors in student academic success. Students should be arriving at school on time every day. If there is anything that is impacting your student's ability to get to school, please reach out to our Support Team Lead, Mrs. Ortega (gortega@rinimc.org), our Dean of Students, Mr. Medina (ymedina@rinimc.org), or myself (tferland@rinimc.org), and we will work with you. Our students matter, and we want to see them in school.

On a final note, I want to remind everyone that Mrs. Ortega recently sent out updates to the RINI Dress Code Policy. These updates are included in this newsletter. The RINI school store is open until Wednesday, November 6th, and will be closed after that until the spring. Orders placed on the school store site will be sent to RINI in a few weeks. Students who need to order their Class A Blue Scrubs need to place this order before Wednesday. Orders can be placed through the store website, here.

## Policy Reminders Phone-Free RINI

All students will be required to place their cell phones in the designated cell phone wall hangers located in each classroom. Students can retrieve their phones at the end of each period and will need to place them back in the wall pouches at the start of their next class. The electronic device must remain in the classroom holder for the entire period.

#### **Attendance Matters!**

RINI opens its doors to students at 7:30AM for breakfast, and Period 1 classes start promptly at 8AM. The Rhode Island Department of Education has launched the Attendance MattersRI Campaign to encourage schools and families to work together on improving school attendance. Research shows that chronic absenteeism (missing 10% or more of the school year) can lead to lower academic achievement, disengagement, course failures, and an increased risk of dropping out.

#### Dress Code

Fall is here! As a reminder, students are NOT allowed to wear hoodies as part of their uniform. We recommend that students bring a cardigan or wear a scrub jacket. There are also coat hooks in classrooms for students to hang coats on as the weather starts to get colder.

Middle school and high school students will read their winning submissions at school and at the annual MLK State Commission Ceremony scheduled for Monday, January 20, 2025.

#### High school essay prompt

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. once wrote, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly."

Reflect on how Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. connected civil rights leaders and everyday people across identities, workplaces, churches, and communities. Explore how Dr. King's strategy is used or could be used to address an important civil rights issue today.

Information on SMS text messaging and Short Codes: SMS stands for Short Message Service and is commonly referred to as a "text message". Most cell phones support this type of text messaging. Our notification provider, SchoolMessenger, uses a true SMS protocol developed by the telecommunications industry specifically for mass text messaging, referred to as "short code" texting. This method is fast, secure and highly reliable because it is strictly regulated by the wireless carriers and only allows access to approved providers.

If you've ever sent a text vote for a TV show to a number like 46999, you have used short code texting.

## **IMPORTANT UNIFORM UPDATES**

## Purpose of Uniform (Scrubs):

The uniform policy at this healthcare-focused organization requires students to wear scrubs to simulate a professional environment and ensure a seamless transition into nursing school. This policy prepares students for the standards and expectations of a healthcare career, emphasizing professionalism, hygiene, and safety.

We have observed several students wearing compression zip-ups or cardigans without a scrub top underneath. While this time is serving as a grace period for zip-ups, please be reminded that it is expected a scrub top is worn underneath the zip-up/cardigan every day.

Students who are out of dress code will receive dress code violations. Multiple violations will require a family meeting.

#### Non-Negotiables

Hoodies are **not** permitted and are non-negotiable. Students will be required to remove hoodies upon entering RINI and are not allowed to wear them during transitions or lunch periods.

#### Non-Negotiables

Hoodies are **not** permitted and are nonnegotiable. Students will be required to remove hoodies upon entering RINI and are not allowed to wear them during transitions or lunch periods.
